Gospel Action: Doing my best using my gifts and talents

Gospel for Sunday 8th February

A reading from Mark 1:29-39

On leaving the synagogue, Jesus went with James and John straight to the house of Simon and Andrew. Now Simon's mother-in-law had gone to bed with fever, and they told him about her straightaway. He went to her, took her by the hand and helped her up. And the fever left her and she began to wait on them.

That evening, after sunset, they brought to him all who were sick and those who were possessed by devils. The whole town came crowding round the door, and he cured many who were suffering from diseases of one kind or another; he also cast out many devils, but he would not allow them to speak, because they knew who he was.

In the morning, long before dawn, he got up and left the house, and went off to a lonely place and prayed there. Simon and his companions set out in search of him, and when they found him they said, 'Everybody is looking for you.' He answered, 'Let us go elsewhere, to the neighbouring country towns, so that I can preach there too, because that is why I came.' And he went all through Galilee, preaching in their synagogues and casting out devils.

Gospel Reflection

This week's gospel follows directly on from last week's reading and, as is typical with Mark's gospel, the events occur on the very same day. The urgency of the gospel is obvious in this week's reading; Jesus had a very busy 24 hours! Having launched his public ministry in the synagogue earlier that day, Jesus accompanies his new disciples to meet some of their family and have a meal. However, on arriving at the home of Simon and Andrew, they find Simon's mother-in-law is sick. Unlike the public displays of his healing power that preceded and will follow this episode, Jesus does not say anything but simply takes the woman by the hand and helps her up. Her response of beginning to wait on Jesus and his disciples is a faith response and recognition of who Jesus is. A theme that runs through this gospel is that the disciples never fully understand who Jesus is. Here, a woman who has just met him recognises him as the Messiah and begins to serve him.

Still on the same day, we see the expansion of Jesus' healing ministry. On this one day he has cast an unclean spirit out of a possessed man in the synagogue, healed Peter's mother-in-law of a fever and then healed the crowds of people who came to the door. The next morning he announces that they will take the ministry to the whole region of Galilee. In a very simple way, the gospel of Mark has described the growth of Jesus' ministry from very humble isolated examples to a deliberate reaching out to the people of an entire region.

Reflection Where and when do you find prayer most powerful?

How can you better follow Jesus' example of using prayer in the busy times?

FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents, Carers and Friends of St Joseph's,

Welcome back to the 2015 School Year. The beginning of the term was a very productive time with the majority of the students attending their Mathematical Assessment Interviews (MAI). It was a great time for parents to catch up with each other and share their stories. The Kindergarten students settled in really well on the first day of their learning journey at St Joseph's Schofields.

I am very appreciative of the parents and carers community for their support in bringing in their children to the MAI appointments. This process is very important in gathering mathematical data which will assist in the planning of the learning and teaching strategies from the very beginning of the year.

This year's mantra is 'Renew and Adapt'. The transition from an industrial to knowledge age has not only impacted on economies and the nature of work but has accelerated the need for transformation in schooling. The ability of schools and systems to renew and adapt is critical to success in today's world. Remember Alvin Toffler's famous warning in 1991 that the 'illiterate of the 21st century will not be those who cannot read and write, but those who cannot learn, unlearn and relearn'.

Finish author and education expert, Pasi Sahlberg, wrote in 2013 that all teachers are vital but the 'culture of the school is even more important for the quality of the school.' All school staff play a critical role in shaping the culture of our school, in shaping the thinking and practices of teachers and in the quality of relationships with parents, parishes and the wider community.

The leadership team of the school, Mrs Delvecchio, Mrs Farhat, Mr Atkins and Miss Mizzi, will be reading a text together this term. The book is "Good to Great to INNOVATE – recalculating the Route to Career Readiness, K - 12+" by Lyn Sharratt and Gale Harild.

The book discusses the importance of developing students to be 'Literate Graduates' embracing multiple forms of multiliteracies – often simultaneously and therefore must be able to:

write with purpose and clarity, communicate effectively using a variety of text forms, read for purpose and pleasure, think critically, locate and access information from a variety of sources, use oral communication appropriate to purpose and audience, "read" and interpret multiple text forms, articulate a point of view, question and respond using higher-order thinking skills, and problem solve.

For the 21st century learner, these skills represent the new "essential" foundational skills required to work and learn with everevolving new technologies (adapted from Sharratt & Fullan, pp 94-150).

Over the coming weeks I look forward to sharing more about the leadership's discussions and learnings whilst we unpack the book together.

St Joseph's is about creating life-long learners who are well equipped to be problem solvers. Learning should be about inquiry, creation, collaboration and fun. Using the tools and technologies of today's world should enhance what we do and allow our children to more fully engage with the world they live in. Learning is best when it is has context and meaning. When done in teams, it allows for greater cognition and depth.

Education is a partnership and I look forward to meeting each of you throughout this year.

- 3. Complete and submit quiz questions this will take approximately 45 minutes
- 4. After successful completion of the module, fill out the form by typing name, email address. contact number, contact address and the school.
- 5. A notification of successful completion of the module will be sent via e-mail to the school and also to the volunteer's email address.
