FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Lk 11:29-32

While still more people gathered in the crowd, Jesus said to them, "This generation is an evil generation; it seeks a sign, but no sign will be given it, except the sign of Jonah. Just as Jonah became a sign to the Ninevites, so will the Son of Man be to this generation. At the judgment, the queen of the south will rise with the men of this generation and she will condemn them, because she came from the ends of the earth to hear the wisdom of Solomon, and there is something greater than Solomon here. At the judgment the men of Nineveh will arise with this generation and condemn it, because at the preaching of Jonah they repented, and there is something greater than Jonah here."

Something greater than Solomon here.

Solomon was known for his wisdom in administration and prowess for the building of the temple in Jerusalem. Jonah's preaching brought conversion to the Ninevites.

Jesus claims that he is greater than Solomon and Jonah, Solomon built the temple of Jerusalem, but Jesus himself is the temple (cf Jn 2:21). Jonah preached repentance, but Jesus brings salvation by offering his life for the forgiveness of our sins.

"Son of Man" signifies Jesus' nature: he is a human being like us and at the same time he is divine, to whom dominion, glory, and kingship are given; all nations and peoples serve him, his dominion is everlasting, and his kingship shall not be destroyed (cf Dn 7:13f). Jesus himself, the Son of Man, is the sign of God's love for us, the sign of God's presence among us. Jesus should indeed be the Lord of our life.

FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents, Carers and Friends of St Joseph's,

Last Friday, Fr Ruben celebrated the Beginning of the School Year Mass. In his homily he talked about the importance of being merciful to others, particularly in this year of Mercy. Fr Ruben emphasized three (3) ways to help us to be merciful to others:-

Be Kind. He encouraged us to act tenderly, joyously, helpfully, gently and be a good natured person.

Be careful with your actions. If we are carrying anger, stress, worry for example, be careful not to take it out on others. The holy Scripture tell us to love others. Love does no harm to its neighbor. We are not to hurt others physically or emotionally. Words do hurt people. Think before you say something to hurt someone's feelings. Not only words said directly to the person, but words said when that person is not around.

Give everyone the benefit of the doubt. When we hear something negative about others or we're suspicious about the motive for their actions, let's stop before we judge their intentions as wrong or bad. Let's give them the benefit of the doubt.



Pope Francis declared this year to be a Jubilee Year of Mercy, a time to extend mercy to others through both acts of forgiveness and care for those who are poor or most in need. We also know ourselves to be in need of mercy as sinners. My favorite definition of mercy is that of my colleague Jim Keenan, SJ, who says that mercy is the willingness to enter into the chaos of another.

In this **Year of Mercy**, we are being asked to work for reconciliation in our families, friendships, and communities.

What, though, can we do when another refuses to reconcile despite our best attempts? While the situation is imperfect, it can still be an opportunity for growth and for love. Here are a few ideas for how to respond.

1. Let go and hand over the situation to God.

We can never control another person's actions. Part of genuine reconciliation is to recognize the dignity of another person and their freedom to respond or not to respond, as she or he sees fit.

2. Accept God's forgiveness.

As good as it might be to hear expressions of forgiveness directly from a person whom we have offended, God is always waiting to extend forgiveness and love. Going to the Sacrament of Reconciliation can help to restore peace to our souls. God's love is unconditional even when human love is conditional.

3. Let the land lie fallow.

Among the practices associated with the jubilee year in the Hebrew Scriptures was allowing fields to lie fallow, i.e., not to plant so that they could have some rest and produce better in another year. Perhaps everyone involved in a damaged relationship needs time to process and to heal. Genuine reconciliation cannot be rushed and may take a very long time. In prayer, God can help us see what we need to see, and to heal where we need to heal.

4. Forgive yourself.

Sometimes seeking **forgiveness** from another is really about an inability to forgive oneself. I regularly visit a prison, and while I find it relatively easy to believe that God forgives others even for the most serious of crimes, forgiving myself is much harder. Yet it is often only when we can love ourselves with our faults and failings that we love the way that God loves us, as we already are: human. We are broken and sinful, but also beautiful in our brokenness. Sin does not make us unworthy of love.

5. Be the prodigal father.

When we think of mercy, it is easy to want to be the prodigal son or daughter who receives mercy. But Henri Nouwen, in *The Return of the Prodigal Son*, writes that we are also called to be the prodigal father. Part of Christian maturity is to learn that we are also the merciful parent, and not only the needy child. We are called not only to receive mercy, but also to be its bearers. Who is in need of our forgiveness? Who yet needs our mercy? And we may find in extending **mercy** to others that we find the very love and mercy for which we were looking.

How else can you work for reconciliation in your family, friendships, and community?

ATTENDANCE

School attendance is not only mandatory, it is vital to student learning. Students who are absent from school, whether it is a full day or part of the day, may be disadvantaged in their learning progress and ongoing development. To maximise the benefits of education for all students, schools are required to follow legislative requirements of the Education Act 1990, to monitor student attendance effectively. While parents are legally responsible for the regular attendance of their children, school staff, as part of their duty of care, record and monitor part and whole day absences.

At St Josephs we will be monitoring school attendance each week. Please ensure that you send in a note explaining your child's absence any time they are away. Failure to do so after 7 days means that your child will be marked absent without reason. The teacher, Assistant Principal or Principal may contact you if we are concerned with your child's attendance at school.

If you require longer leave, please follow the following guidelines.

1-9 days absence: Parents must notify the school principal by mail or email (in written form).

10-99 days absence: Parents must complete and submit the Application for Extended Leave form prior to commencing leave OR apply for extended leave in writing to the principal directly. If approved, the Principal issues a Certificate of Extended Leave. If the principal declines this application (i.e it is not within the best interest of the child to take leave and be absent from school), a letter notifying parents that the application has been declined would be forthcoming from the school. The certificates are attached to the letter of extended leave or application form.

CASE MANAGEMENT

At St Josephs we provide opportunities for teachers to bring forward a student that is concerning them after they have tried out different strategies in the classroom. Case Management is a forum for the discussion of student work as data, in a case-by-case approach. The focus of the conversation is on providing the teacher with support to best meet the needs of that student. The teacher, learning support teacher, Literacy or Numeracy lead teacher and the principal or assistant principal collaboratively work together to problem solve and find the best strategies for these children. Learning needs are identified and goals are set with strategies to meet those goals. The teachers meet every fortnight to monitor the progress of the student.

HOUSE COLOURS

At the last Assembly, the house colours captains officially launched their house colours and its significance to St Josephs. I have included some information as to why the following house colours have been selected at our school.

St Josephs is a Josephite school. Mary Mackillop started the Sister's of St Josephs, also knows as the Josephite Sisters, named after St Joseph, Jesus' earthly father.

To honour Mary Mackillop, we have chosen our House colours based on Mary Mackillop, significant places and people in her life.

RED – MacKillop – As a Josephite School, we Honour Mary Mackillop who started the Sister's of St Joseph and opened the first St Joseph's school in Penola in 1866.

BLUE - Penola is the name of the Blue house colour. This is the place where Mary Mackillop and Father Julian Tenison Wood, co –founded the Sister's of St Josephs in 1866. Mary Mackillop started her mission as a Sister of St Joseph and opened her first St Joseph's school with Father Tennison Woods in his Parish of Penola so that the poor children could get an education.

YELLOW- TENISON – Father Julian Tenison Wood helped Mary Mackillop start the Sister's of St Josephs and worked with her to open the school in Penola for the poor children.

GREEN - FITZROY - This is the place in Melbourne where Mary Mackillop was born in 1842.


